Spring brings so much to observe in nature. April is a great time to find spring butterflies, it's spring migration for birds, and the frogs are singing. It is reproduction time for many species. Get out there and enjoy!

Time to balance your egg! The spring equinox (vernal) fell on Wednesday, March 20, 2019, at 5:58 P.M. EDT. This event marks the astronomical first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere. Day and night are almost equal in length.

Celebrate the equinox by observing nature around you! According to the Almanac, people have celebrated by doing some of the following:

Balance an egg—Folklore tells us that eggs will stand on the equinox. Many people have had success with keeping eggs balanced for the day. Try it and see!

Watch for worms emerge—The Full Worm Moon was named as a result of people observing the emergence of worms when the full moon occurs on the equinox.

Notice the arc of the Sun across the sky—It shifts toward the north. Birds may be using it as the path northward in migration.

Listen to the birds—Increasing sunlight triggers birds to sing.

Listen for frogs—Get out that frog call CD and see if you can identify frogs by sound. Observe the emergence of flowers—First the Crocus, then daffodils, then wisteria, etc. Start planting—Plant some native plants in your yard for the pollinators, they need the nutrients from the nectar and their host plants for their caterpillars.

Welcome to Cryptogams

During March, Helen Hamilton conducted one workshop, three times, called **Welcome to Cryptogams.** She has been studying Pteridophytes (ferns), Lycophytes (Clubmosses, plus), and Bryophytes (Mosses and Liverworts) in the last few years, gone to workshops and classes, and she also published her book, *Ferns & Mosses of Virginia's Coastal Plain.* After she attended a recent class, she became very excited about sharing some of what she has learned with her friends in Williamsburg.

The focus was on plants that reproduce by spores, without flowers or seeds—**cryptogams**, which include ferns, mosses, liverworts, and other plants. She provided an overview of evolutionary history, taxonomy, anatomy, and life cycles of cryptogams. Mid-morning, we went outside of the Freedom Park office to find samples of these plants. The diversity in a very small area was amazing. Helen identified a number of mosses and a liverwort for us. Inside, she provided binocular microscopes so that we could study plant structures of samples.

Participants included several Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, and Native Plant Society members. Many of the participants were novices, and the workshop only began to cover the surface. However, many of us were inspired and to try to identify some of what we collected. Here are some photos to spark your interest.



Bassett Trace Nature Trail Is Open

"What's old is new again!" That's how I describe the Bassett Trace Nature Trail in Colonial Williamsburg. For those who have not discovered this local wonder, I hope you will make time to explore it soon.

In the last month, Rick Brown along with some "spear carriers" have installed 20 tree labels and trail markers on the Bassett Trace Nature Trail. We need for leaves to come out to ID a couple trees!

Since the beginning of 2019, Colonial Williamsburg has worked to improve/replace/repair railings and steps, cleared downed trees, installed signage, and redefined the trail entrance.

Meanwhile, the trail is open to the public! No ticket required. The trail is well marked all the way to the Green Course, 1.4 miles one way. Just follow the bright orange circles out and back. Be sure to look for the tree labels on 20 native trees near the trail. The official opening of the trail was Wednesday, March 20—Colonial Williamsburg Hospitality Group hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony that was open to the public I hope a HRC volunteer (or a couple of volunteers) will adopt the trail for Wildlife Mapping. Over 140 species of birds have been documented there (thanks to Nancy Barnhart and others). Just in the days before I found two snakes, two butterfly species,
