Cloud Observations Help NASA

The Cloud Observer app is one tool that citizen scientists use to assist NASA in understanding the Earth's energy budget and its effects on the Earth's climate. This effort to measure and understand actually began in the early 1970s, and by the 1980's, NASA realized it needed to extend and improve the data collection. To accomplish this, the Earth's Radiant Energy System (CERES) family of instruments was developed and, in 1997, the first measurement was taken in Gloucester, VA. But at this point the measurements had to be compiled by hand, a very time-consuming project. The scientists realized this long-term project needed electronic documentation and so the Globe Observer app was developed.

The Globe Observer app can be used to make observations in four areas: clouds, mosquito habitat, land cover, and trees. Clouds are the area of focus at this point for the Historic Rivers Chapter and many of us were able to help with observations.

These optimal ground observations of the clouds are made within +/- 15 minutes of the satellite overpass times to ensure you are observing the same set of clouds from which the satellite is collecting data. An observation takes approximately 5 minutes and is usually done a couple of times a day. Within a day or two, an email is sent from NASA LaRC (Langley Research Center) verifying an observation with corresponding satellite data.

By January of 2022, the observations recorded by contributors were nearing ONE MILLION! The Virginia Master Naturalists around the commonwealth made frequent observations and were teamed together in a friendly competition with other schools, scouts, and individuals. The push was on to reach the 1,000,000 matching goal.

By early August the million marker was just

around the corner. NASA began to plan a GLOBE Clouds Match to a Million Celebration. VMN received an invitation to visit NASA LaRC along with other groups who were participating in the citizen scientist service project. And so, on September 13th, we headed to Reid Hall on the NASA campus to share our efforts and celebrate this huge accomplishment.

As visitors for a day at NASA LaRC, we had official badges and met a wonderful group of CERES scientists and administrators. A poster had been made by NASA LaRC which highlighted the Master Naturalist contribution to the Clouds project, including VMN's nearly 1600 observations. Using this poster, we talked informally about our experiences using the app to the NASA scientists and Langley administrators who stopped by. We were honored that each NASA representative took the time to visit with us and truly wanted to learn about the Historic Rivers Chapter and Virginia Master Naturalists. We even talked with the director and the deputy director of the NASA LaRC (whose spouse is a Master Naturalist with the Peninsula Chapter!). They both explained to us that this celebration was a way to reach out to the students and youth of the nation—the future of science and research. We recognized NASA's level of commitment as we visited with school groups, girl scouts, educators, scientists, and students as young as 9. We learned how a woman with limited sight was able to enter her observations and spoke with a hearing-impaired college student who had completed

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some substantial research. Another e-learning team was connecting students from all over the world to the Million Celebration. Everyone was interested in sharing their knowledge and experiences as well as learning from each other.

This was a great opportunity for both of us—as Master Naturalists and as citizens—to really see how our observations are being used in the greater community and scientific world. The excitement and dedication shared by the staff of NASA Langley was inspiring. We felt proud to represent HRC and be a part of this celebration.

A Great Bluebird Year

Our 2022 bluebird season has ended – and what a season it's been! With 103 monitors over our 20 trails, we've checked on a wide variety of species, including our beloved bluebirds. Here's a summary of the season and, hopefully, an incentive to join our trails and monitor with us next year.

In 2022, we monitored 330 boxes and over half our Chapter members volunteered to support at least one trail and many monitored several! A remarkable total of 1,172 hours were documented by volunteers on these trails, and we fledged 1,101 bluebird chicks – nearly one new bluebird for every volunteer hour! The chart below compares the fledges of our different species.

Our first bluebird egg was laid at JCC Marina on March 25th; our first hatch was April 8th at Freedom Park; our first fledge was at Freedom Park on April 21st; and our final fledge was on August 30th on the Colonial Parkway trail.

In this season, there was disappointment as well as success. While fledging a total of 1,269 baby birds, we also lost quite a few. We had 91 missing/

destroyed eggs, 97 missing chicks, 139 infertile eggs, and 65 chicks found dead in the nest.

Sadly, we also had a variety of predations – 20 snakes, 1 raccoon, 1 vandal, 11 insect infestations, 2 weather incidents, 9 House Sparrow attacks, 1 Tree Swallow attack, and 28 unknown reasons for bird deaths.



But despite these predations, it has been a wonderful bluebird season. Trail leaders and team members were creative in solving problems and their creativity and persistence allowed us to monitor both effectively and safely. A huge thank you to all the members who have volunteered over all the years to make this a fun learning activity!! And, with high hopes, we wait for volunteers to step up to help monitor our trails in 2023!
